



General Information

Thank you for your interest in NYU's Master of Public Health program. We are pleased to offer you the opportunity to apply to our program online. Only applications that are complete will be processed and reviewed for admission. For an application to be considered complete, the Admissions Office must receive all of the following application materials by the deadlines indicated:

- The online application, including the personal statement and resume or curriculum vitae
- Official transcripts from each post-secondary institution attended
- Three letters of recommendation, each accompanied by the NYU MPH Recommendation Form
- TOEFL scores for applicants who are not U.S. Citizens or Permanent Residents and for whom English is not the native language
- GRE scores for applicants to the Community & International Health & Public Health Nutrition concentrations (Applicants to Global Health Leadership are not required to submit a GRE score)
- A non-refundable application fee of \$75 payable by check, money order or credit card

NOTE: Applications will not be considered complete or reviewed for admission until ALL supporting documents have been received.

Application Requirements

1. The **online application**, completed as instructed. The application is available at <https://app.applyyourself.com/?id=nyumph>
2. One **official transcript** from each academic institution attended, indicating courses completed, grades/evaluations received and degree awarded (where applicable). Official transcripts must be submitted for any postsecondary work undertaken, regardless of whether or not a degree was awarded. Please note that current transcripts must be submitted for any degrees currently in progress.

An official transcript is an original version issued directly by the institution in a sealed envelope with the stamp of the institution's registrar across the back seal. If your transcripts do not indicate the degree awarded or qualification attained, you must submit a copy of your diploma along with your official transcript. Faxes, scanned copies, emailed copies, or any other reproduction of transcripts will not be accepted.

For international applicants or those attending foreign institutions: (1) If your official transcripts are not in English, The Admissions Office must receive both the official documents and their certified English translation. (2) If your institution does not issue transcripts, you must submit a letter in a sealed envelope from the institution, stating its policy. Only then will we consider a copy of a transcript, certified by an appropriate embassy or consulate in the institution's country. (3) It is the applicant's responsibility to provide evidence of the degree's U.S. equivalency. The NYU MPH strongly encourages the use of an academic credentialing agency (such as [World Education Services](#)) before submitting your documents. The Program reserves the right to request such documentation from an applicant if the degree or its equivalency is in question. If you have questions regarding foreign transcripts, please contact us and we will be happy to help you.

3. Three **letters of recommendation**, each accompanied by the NYU MPH Recommendation Form. Each recommendation should be submitted by the recommender through the online application system or mailed in a sealed envelope with the signature of the recommender across the back seal of the envelope. Faxes, scanned copies, emailed copies, or any other reproduction will not be accepted, nor will we accept recommendations that have been opened by the applicant.

We strongly encourage recommenders to submit their recommendations for applicants online through the application system. Doing so allows for quicker review of the application and allows applicants to track the status of their recommendations.

4. The **Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)** including the Test of Written English (TWE), is required of all applicants who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents and for whom English is not the native language. Only official score reports will be considered. Please note that official TOEFL score reports must be sent to us directly from ETS. When ordering test reports from ETS, you must include the proper institution code for the NYU MPH (8752). Copies of score reports will not be accepted under any circumstances.

5. An official **Graduate Record Examination (GRE)** score report for an exam taken within the past 5 years. The GRE must be taken again if your GRE scores are older than 5 years. When ordering test reports from ETS, you must include the proper institution code for the NYU MPH (8752)

The Admission Process

Admission review is conducted on a rolling basis; applications are reviewed in order of their receipt and completion. We encourage you to submit your materials as early as possible as admission offers are extended throughout the year and space will become limited as the deadline approaches.

Application Timeline

December 15	Applications to all dual degree programs are due. Applications should be submitted for each degree program, following the respective program's application instructions.
February 1	All other applications are due for both domestic and international applicants. Admission review is conducted on a rolling basis. Once an application is complete, it will be forwarded to the Admissions Committee for review.
April 15	All candidates who meet the above deadlines will be notified of Admissions Committee decisions by this date.

Financial Aid

Process: All domestic and international applicants who wish to be considered for program scholarships will be evaluated for a program award at the time of application. No additional paperwork beyond the application form is required in order to be considered for program scholarships.

All domestic applicants (U.S. citizens or permanent residents) who wish to be considered for federal and/or state financial aid must submit the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)** using FAFSA on the Web (available at <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>). The University's institution code is 002785.

Deadline: Domestic applicants who wish to be considered for financial aid should submit the FAFSA by February 1st. Do not wait to be accepted for admission to submit a FAFSA.

Timing: File the FAFSA by the appropriate deadline. Do not wait to be accepted for admission. Do not wait until your taxes are done. Although it is better to do your taxes early, it is acceptable to use estimates of your income, so long as they do not vary significantly from the actual values. You can make corrections later on the FAFSA web site. Applying after the deadline may delay the processing of federal aid and student loans. NYU's Office of Financial Aid will begin mailing official award letters in late March for fall admits.

Application Tips

Listed below are some helpful tips to consider during the application process.

1. **Start early.** It may take some time for your official transcripts, test scores and recommendations to arrive in our office. Plan ahead and request official documents well in advance of the application deadline, and be sure that your recommenders have sufficient time to provide a thoughtful evaluation. It is your responsibility to ensure that all documents have been received in the program office by the appropriate deadlines.

2. For items to be submitted by mail, put your name and address on the envelopes you give to references and schools. When the items are returned to you, they can be sent in one package to the Office of Admission.

3. Do not send any copies of application documents, as they will not be accepted as part of your application.

4. After you have submitted your application, remember to use the online application system to check the status of your application. The system allows you to monitor which application documents have been received by the Admissions Office, including recommendations, transcripts, and test scores. It will also let you know when your application is considered complete, when it is under review by the admissions committee, and whether or not an admissions decision is available.
